

REGULAR COUNCIL MEETING AUGUST 2, 2011

The first semi-monthly meeting of Mansfield City Council met on Tuesday, August 2, 2011 at 7:30 PM in the Council Chambers of the City Building.

The Pledge of Allegiance was recited by the audience.

Councilman Mike Hill led the audience in prayer.

ROLL CALL: The following answered present at roll call: Carmichael, Haring, Hazen, Hightower, Hill, Jefferson, Rock, Scott and Versaw.

There being no objections, the reading of the Journal and Communications were dispensed with.

TIM HARLESS, CHILDREN SERVICES: Carl and I attend as many council meetings we possibly can, township meetings, municipality meetings and we just kind of update on what's happening with Children Services. How we're involved with community and ask for continued support from the City of Mansfield. Carl will go over some statistical data with you guys in a few minutes but one of the things I wanted to talk about and as we went through that prayer, it kind of struck me that at Children Services, business is booming and that's often times, not something that you want to brag about in a community. We had 2900 investigations last year of child abuse and neglect and we're on pace this year to break that number, probably over 3000 intakes that we'll investigate of child abuse and neglect. We deal with over 500 families on a daily basis with over 700-800 children every day so that's not something that we're proud of. We do provide support of services to families in Richland County and the City of Mansfield. We're in the process of developing putting together a kinship center down on 4th St. with the cooperation of UMADOAP and the City of Mansfield DRCA. I'll be quiet for a few minutes and let Carl go through some of the activities that we participate within the City of Mansfield as well.

CARL HUNNELL, CHILDREN SERVICES: One of the things I think I left in front of everybody is just a copy of our annual report and also a brochure that just talks a little bit in general about the services the agency provides. We are a county agency but when I say that, we probably do more business within the city limits than we do outside the city limits. I wish I had that number with me right now, at some point I could get it and I'll send it along to you so you can see the zip code breakdown. Couple things I wanted to touch on, one, since we were here last, our agency made a decision last fall to forgo collection on a million dollars in local property taxes in 2011. With our cash reserve we thought that was something we could do, we talked to the auditors outside the agency, they looked at it, they said we could do it, so that's one million dollars that stays in the hands of men and women of Richland County and we're pretty proud of that. We're getting through this year without it. One of the things I think you'll see in the inside is just how active Children Services is in the community. Couple of things I wanted to touch on that we participate in within the City of Mansfield. We're in the Miss Ohio

Parade almost every year, we're in the Mansfield Halloween parade, we're in the Mansfield Holiday parade. This year we participated throughout at the Juneteenth celebration, we were at the Minority Health Fair with the Black History Month event. There was a break this year between the end of the city school year and the beginning of the summer. Success center program where kids can get free lunches and breakfast, so we worked with our friends at Panera Bread, Jones chips and some other agencies and were able to provide 200 lunches a day for those 3 days. Couple other of the community departments we worked with, Bob Evans, who worked on the farmhouse feasts which gave complete turkey dinner to folks at Thanksgiving. Coats for kids, we did with Donley Ford. Last December, 500+ local children got Christmas gifts to the agency, partnering with Richland County children's Auxiliary, the Fran and Warren Rupp Foundation and others. Those are some of the kinds of things that go on behind the scenes with our agency that might not generate all the headlines and all the stories that you see. I'll let Tim talk a little bit about some of the financial stuff that involves the city.

TIM HARLESS: I wanted to congratulate and give some props to Mayor Culliver. I've been part of the Department of Regional Community Advancement for quite some time. I've grown attached to it. Our Director, Randy Parker, allowed me to be down there for nearly 2 years on a full time basis to provide some advocacy for that success center after school program as well as the summer program that continues as we speak. The agency, over the past 2 years, has directed funds toward the RCA because we realize that with kids not having opportunities within the community to participate in things like that, it causes a lot of problems for other areas and other department within the City of Mansfield. You feed kids, you give kids something to do between those hours of after school and 7:00, they're less likely to engage in juvenile delinquency and those types of things. So, with the limited resources and the problems that we have within our community right now, I think it's essential that we find ways to allow that program to continue. The agency, in 2010, provided \$126,000 for Kindship services and an additional \$34,000 for the success program. In 2011, the agency has partnered with the RCA for \$131,000 for the Kinship services, \$17,000 towards the Success center program and in addition, the Help Me Grow contract at the agency participated in it in 2010, forgo the amount of money that we would have, basically be reimbursed for and allowed the City of Mansfield to continue with the contract at \$95,000. so, we see that as a resource for the community, we see that as a resource for the kids of Richland County and the City of Mansfield and hope that council would continue to support that.

CARL HUNNELL: I guess I'll just close by saying, when you look at that annual report, there's been some sort of Children Services in Richland County since 1883. That's when the children's home was first built, so we like to think we've spend 127 years protecting children in Richland County. In a nutshell, it's who we are and it's what we do.

MR. HAZEN: I think, on the one hand, (inaudible) you've got a pretty good reputation and a lot of people appreciate your services that you provide, but on the other hand, it's still heartbreaking to know you've had some cases that have been difficult and that's

tough too. We really appreciate what you're doing. It is making a difference, even if you don't see it.

CARL HUNNELL: Before I started working at Children Services, one of the misconceptions I had, and I think it's still a popular misconception within the community is that we're here to come take your kids away when the exact opposite is true. We're not in the business of raising your children, we want to keep your kids home with you as long as we can keep them safe and in 2002, the agency had 250 children in custody. We had a residence hall, we had group homes. We no longer have those things and we've gone from 250 in custody to 44 at the end of this last year. We've been keeping kids at home and keeping them safe is the best way to go.

MAYOR CULLIVER: I'd also like to comment and thank you for what you've done for the city as a whole. We appreciate your help at Ocie Hill and these kids are the most wonderful in our society and without your help they would get lost and fall through the cracks. You guys have stepped up to the plate and made sure that we can help each other service the community and I really appreciate that. Thank you for all that you do.

CARL HUNNELL: We were happy a couple weeks ago to meet with the Mayor and some folks from DRCA. They needed some additional funds to get the summer success program through, I think it runs through Aug. 12, the agency agreed to do that, I think that's where the \$17,000 comes from which also includes again this year, the kids are going to the zoo in Akron, oh, they've been already? Well, we provided the buses and buy some of the tickets to get the kids in as well, so that was something we were happy to do because you're absolutely right. They're some of the most vulnerable children in the community and we really feel like that's where we need to be.

RUDY FLORES, HUMAN RELATIONS COMMISSION: President Scott and City Council, Mayor Culliver and gentlemen, on behalf of the Human Relations Commission, we're here to present this plaque to CHAP in appreciation for the dedication, leadership and outstanding service to this community and here to receive the plaque is the Executive Director Ms. Reedy and the Asst. Director and I'll cut it short and let them say a few words.

MS. REEDY: Thank you very much and we are very honored to get this award and thanks to the city for all that you've done to support us for 11, going on 12 years now. I'm going to let Kim talk because the foundation of our program are community health workers and Kim is our lead community health worker that's basically running the site now.

KIM PHINNESSEE: I am community health worker, I do home visits, I'm in the community working with pregnant women and their babies, making sure they are going to prenatal care, prenatal appointments, we work with the 3 medical providers, Buckeye, Care Source and (inaudible) with high risk pregnancy clients and basically we're just connecting them to resources in the community that will help with the outcome that we are looking for.

MRS. HIGHTOWER: I would like to say thank you because I know of the work that you do and I know the clients you have helped and it makes a tremendous difference in their lives and the lives of their children and their babies and I think one year we were a part of helping to donate to CHAPS but it is such an awesome, awesome program that you have and so for all the ones that you're going to help and the ones that you have helped, I say thank you very much.

MAYOR CULLIVER: I want to thank the Human Relations Commission for actually recognizing the great things that CHAP does and I also want to thank CHAP and when you look around our community, many of these people have negative thoughts but they don't actually see all the good things that are happening in our community. CHAP is now really a nationally know program and recently right here in Mansfield, Ohio and I want to thank you ladies for that recognition because not only does it (inaudible) Mansfield, but it also (inaudible) of going out there and not only talking about things, but getting it done. Thank you very much for the fine work you do.

ESTHER MCNEIL, 304 E. ARCH ST.: First I'd like to say about Calisolar, the plant that was going out to GM. As far as I can say, or come up with, they lied to everybody in this community and our Governor lied to you too. If he was sitting there, I would tell him the same thing. He lied. I say that because he said, Mississippi had a better climate. That is untrue. Mississippi has higher drug problem, higher murder rate and they are anti-union. They have been for a long time. I can say that, I have a cousin who's a Senator, but I was just down there and I spoke to a gentleman who's the president of a union, actually the company was here, it was Mansfield Tire. They moved to Mississippi and changed hands a couple times but it's still there. They have got these people, they've been on strike for one year two months, this would be the 3rd month. The Mayor of Columbus, Mississippi has 2 sons wok in this plant. Now, they got all scabs but they still got the union on strike. They people down there do not care about these people that's been on strike. It's the first strike in 40 years and for them to say it's a better climate down there, better climate for who? The price of living is higher than it is here and you got to pay almost \$6 for a gallon of milk, you can't tell me that the climate there is better than it is here. Nobody's going to believe that. I went to the air force base because I can get on bases. It's even higher on the air force base and what they tell me there, you should see the prices downtown, I already looked at the prices downtown. So, they're telling you is untrue. They knew from the start that they was not going to build out here. They used us and for the Governor to say what he said, whew. Yes, we have some union workers that need to be fired, everybody knows that, but how they're doing it down there, the bosses would not complete the paperwork so the union files a grievance and win. That's elementary. Do the paperwork. Next, the city's going to take over the army reserve center, alright. Who's going to pay for the removal of the asbestos in that building?

MAYOR CULLIVER: I'm sure we're not taking over the army reserve building.

MR. MCNEIL: You haven't taken it over yet.

MAYOR CULLIVER: We are NOT going to take over the reserve building. Next question please. If we are, it's news to me.

MR. MCNEIL: I'm hearing from the military that it's going to the city.

PRESIDENT SCOTT: Evidently you're hearing wrong information.

MR. MCNEIL: We'll see. If you do get it, who's going to pay for that?

PRESIDENT SCOTT: I think that's a hypothetical and I don't think we need to get into that.

MR. MCNEIL: This article here is where the government is getting on Guatemala cuz they're not unionized. They're fighting to get these people to join the union but they won't support the unions here. What kind of crap is that? This is our government. They did it in Poland, now they're doing it in Guatemala. We're sticking our nose, making sure they're unionized down there but we don't care about the unions here in America. It's dumb. In America, we have, because of the unions, a better way of life, even the ones that are non-union. They pay to keep the unions out. This is why some places, I'm going to call them, like Rupp, Warren Rupp. They pay good so they unions don't come in. Thanks you.

SSD MESSER: I have an answer to some questions that came up last night. The Ohio Municipal League liability contract expires in April of 2012 and Director Remy, the Mayor, Jim DeSanto and I met briefly today to talk about a bid process for the OML contract that we discussed last night and we'll give you further updates on that as, probably last this year, early next year. The Clerk of Courts ability to add information to the website, they set up a portal today for that. They showed me how it was going to work and we'll arrange training for the council clerks within the next week or so. It looks like it's a pretty simple process and a great idea to keep the legislation and pending legislation up timely and turned over and we'll see that that takes place next week. I briefly looked at Municipal Court general fund budget and just out of curiosity, I pulled a 1999 final budget and in 1999 wages and salaries for the judges and staff totaled \$664,000 and in 2011 this years budget is \$400,579 so it's about a quarter million dollars less than it was in 1999. So, it's a significant difference and also keep in mind that about 40% of the judges salaries and their support staff is reimbursed to us by the county. And those savings are very consistent throughout the budget for the last 10 years as well, but I'm sure you'll hear more about that from the judges as the budget process moves forward.

MR. VERSAW: I do have one comment on Municipal Court. In 1999, everything was in the general fund. Now, you got the general fund, you got the 219 account, 225 account, 226 account and it's probably double of what it was in 1999. Back when Mayor Reid, in order to balance a budget, I don't know what that year was, 2003 or 4, she worked with the judges to break that out so we could keep the general fund dollars down. So the total, if you want to look at the total dollars, total expenditures in the Municipal

Court, you got to look at the general fund, the 219 account, 225 account and 226 account and you add all those up together and it's significantly greater than it was in 1999.

SSD MESSER: That's true. But on thing you have to keep in mind are the special funds, 19, 26, 225, 224 funds, those are grant accounts, so as the money comes in, it's utilized, earmarked and the 225 and 226 accounts are the special dockets, special revenue funds where if I'm going to participate in domestic violence court I pay a fee to participate in it so it's self funding and they are restricted fines and costs. So in other words, if you don't use the money for that purpose, you can't charge it and you can't spend it anywhere else, but certainly these are discussions that will take place during the budget process, but we did a comparison just looking at general fund 101 monies, is what we were talking about last night.

MAYOR CULLIVER: I was going to make, basically, the same comment and then there's always a price to pay for progress. What took us over into fiscal watch and then emergency was the general fund and the courts have been gracious to us to help that and if the courts hadn't did what they did, we'd have a whole lot more people laid off. The numbers speak for themselves and if anybody come up with a docket that don't cost us money, it's different than trying to point a finger at folk who are trying to do a job and using that funds that we don't have and they've been really gracious and you have to take a look at it now, when we went through this budgetary process. We told them to please help us and give us x amount of dollars and they went beyond the percentage that we asked them to do so the courts have helped us with our problems.

MRS. HARING: I have some information. It was news to me and I hope it is news to you and will help you better understand this process. I had been asked why we are amending our ordinance if we are not sure who enforces it and Crystal, who works in the Clerk of Courts office came forward last night and informed me that the Dog Warden does write tickets across the county and city. We have 1 ½ dog wardens. One full time, one part time. And they write approximately 6-7 tickets on vicious dogs a week and Crystal does handle those tickets. Occasionally our local policemen will write a ticket. What is the difference there, when the Dog Warden writes a ticket, he writes it under state law. The fines from the ticket go into the county treasury. If we had a partnership with the dog warden, then tickets written in the City of Mansfield would go into our treasury, the way I understand it. So, I guess the biggest point here is that any time there is a call about a vicious dog, it goes to the dog warden, he does handle it, he does write a ticket and they are doing the best they can, so for us to go ahead with this ordinance, of course it's important. Will it be enforced, currently, probably not, but we have it on the books for future reference. If you want to report a vicious dog sighting (inaudible) you can get that report. I have a phone number.

Upon motion by Mrs. Carmichael that Bill 11-131 be read and placed upon the floor for discussion, seconded by Mr. Jefferson. The bill was read and placed upon the floor for final passage, seconded by Mr. Jefferson. The vote was taken and resulted as follows: Ayes: 7, Nays: 1. Ayes: Carmichael, Haring, Hazen, Hightower, Hill, Jefferson and Rock. Nay: Versaw.

The bill was declared passed, signed by the President, approved by the Mayor and attested by the Clerk.

MR. VERSAW: Here we go again. Another frustration. Every contract, every agreement that city council has to vote on we get the particulars of the contract on Monday night and here we are Tuesday night to vote on it. I understand, I caught wind, that there was already an agreement and I understand that the FOP signed this agreement on June 23. And if you read the present collective bargaining bill, it says that once there's an agreement, council has to be notified within 14 days and we have 30 days to vote on it. This is the present collective bargaining bill. And the new collective

bargaining bill they give you 30 days to notify you and another 30 days to ratify it. So they must think that council needs a little more time, but this is the Ohio Revised Code. So, here we are tonight with an agreement that was agreed upon June 23rd. We were told about it last night and we don't get anything to look at, I finally got something to look at. All we did in the meeting was, here's the particulars of the contract. The ORC says we're supposed to vote on this but I think the ORC is incorrect, it probably should just say, the administration can just go ahead and take it and vote on it themselves because basically what they're doing is they're negotiating and they're getting the final contract and basically say council, here it is, you should vote on it. Over the years, we just vote on it. So, one of the biggest things that we do is voting on contracts and the budget, which the contracts affect big time. That's my concern with this contract. We're being told, by a number of people in administration, they talked to people in Columbus and we should pass this thing and on and on. So, I guess, many of the members of council say, ok, if that's what we're supposed to do I guess we should do it. But, my concern is, my real concern is that next year is going to be a very, very difficult year and budget and trying to balance a budget and trying to continue to offer services to the City of Mansfield as the levels they are this year. We know that the revenues, just from the state are probably going to be, we're hearing anywhere from like \$1.5 million, up to \$1.5 million less in revenues next year than they gave us this year and the state tax is going to kick in during this contract and what's really got me concerned is that the, I think Friday the (?) numbers are going to come out. Already in Ohio the manufacturing is down, the employment is down even more so than they originally thought. Unemployment is up in Mansfield and Richland County. I'm not so sure that next year's, economy wise I don't know if it's going to be any better or it could be worse than it is this year and yet we're talking about a contract here that is really, basically, revenue neutral. In other words, there's really no savings in the length of the contract. There might be a little bit of savings next year in health insurance, we don't know what that's going to be, it's only by people turning in and illnesses and whatever affects our city employees, so we don't really know what it's going to affect but the majority of the savings is going to be, we are told, in the health insurance. So, I'm really concerned that when we start, and what I hear from the administration is that some of these line items for salaries and wages and benefits are coming in for next year about what they are this year. But I have a feeling we're going to have to probably cut those back a little bit because of the revenue projections, but, so I'm really concerned that, I don't know what this contract's going to do for us if its revenue neutral, got \$1.5 million less revenues next year. I'm not sure this is the best thing but we're told that it is and we should vote on it. I guess, my thoughts are I'm really nervous about it so I think I'm probably going to vote no, but that's up to the rest of council. Two reasons to vote no. I don't think that we know whether we can afford it or not for one thing and the other thing is that the administration just gives it to us and said, vote on it and you should vote on it without really knowing, just a brief explanation last night what's even in it. I don't think anybody's even seen what's in it. I know the rest of council hasn't. I asked for it, so that's my thoughts.

MAYOR CULLIVER: I have two comments. First of all, everybody can remember some time back Doug made a comment that the administration don't allow, and I guess the administration is me, don't allow him to talk to other administrators. But obviously,

that's not true because he's talking to the administrators but he's not talking to me at all. That's the first thing. Second thing is, if you take a look at what our police have done with other unions, we've shown him the breakdown of everything they've given up, so if the police dept. worked with us, with our budget and given up multiple things that other folks didn't, why would he think that, because there's a track record here, we don't know what next year is going to hold and I think it's going to be bad too, but I do know there's a fact that they have worked with us in the past and I don't see a problem with them working with us in the future. So, what do you do? You slap people in the face when they work with you? There's something about that that kind of irks me because there's no logic in that. These guys have been wonderful trying to help us with our budget and then he's going to slap them in the face. There's something wrong with that. That's all I have to say and I appreciate everything that you guys have done to try and work with us and we've been talking about this over and over again, working with the unions, they've been bringing ideas and everything that you guys have told us, we always bring back, hey, this is what's been said, how can you work through these problems and they've worked with us on these issues, so thank you for what you've done and I hope that everybody sees that police have worked with us and has partnered with us to try and bring down the costs and please accept this as a yes vote.

MR. ROCK: This question is for Director Remy, I know last night you said there's some language in here that you wanted to see cleaned up, was that cleaned up?

LAW DIRECTOR REMY: It will be. (Microphone not on).

MR. JEFFERSON: I'd just like to make a comment. I want to commend the Mayor and his staff and the FOP for working together and the FOP for giving up some things that they had acquired in the past years. I've been on council about 12 years and every contract that's came before me before, all the unions were asking for things. More, more, more. And it was given. So that kind of helped us get in this situation but now we have the unions starting to work with the administration for the good of the city and I'm not opposed to that. I just want to commend them on that and I hope they do that in the future because I won't be here, unfortunately, for reasons. And the other thing is, Mr. Versaw, you say you don't seem to like it, give me your solution. I mean, you're a leader up here, I want to know, you don't like this contract, what do you propose to the rest of council that we should look at that would resolve some of your concerns?

MR. VERSAW: Mr. Jefferson, it's too late. It's a done deal. If we wanted to offer suggestions, we should have done that back 3, 4, 5 months ago but we weren't even told they were in negotiations, so we weren't even, their contract is really not up until next August, a year from now at the end of this month. We assumed, we aren't communicated with, we assumed that the contract is going til then. If I would have known that they were going into an agreement, in negotiations with the FOP, maybe we could have had a say, but we had no say. We just have to vote on it. We have to vote on something that's given to us without our input, without any asking us what we would like to see in a contract, but the ORC says we have to vote on it, it won't take effect until we vote on it but we're in the dark, completely in the dark until tonight.

MR. JEFFERSON: Well, you said earlier that you had taken a chance to look at it, you had time to look at some of it, and therefore, could you recommend that we not vote on it. We've got to vote on it.

MR. VERSAW: We have to vote on it. But just take a look at the medical. I was looking at the medical. Just for brand drugs, \$8 for 30 days, \$20 for 90 days. Now, I'm on my wife's plan at Med Central hospital. That same drug for 90 days is \$100. 5 times what they pay here. Just go through this. We've been talking about this forever. This is a Cadillac plan. There's nobody in the City of Mansfield that comes close to this plan, but that's the way it is, so it's too late now to make any changes.

MR. JEFFERSON: Thank you for that, but I understand what you're saying on that side but they still have given back some things. You started somewhere and now we're headed in the right direction and I think we need to work toward that in the future.

MR. VERSAW: I'm hoping that they'll work with us next year if we go into a downturn and we do come up short in revenues and we do have to make layoffs and it doesn't have to be the street dept. again or AFSCME that the other bargaining units will work with the administration on trying to help when times are tough because the citizens of Mansfield would like the services they have but if they're going to get less services with less employees because we don't have the dollars next year, then that's when they need to work with us. I'm hoping they come back and work with us next year.

MRS. HIGHTOWER: I think I want to say something. I just want to thank Mr. Messer and the administration for the work they did do. I wasn't there, I don't know, but I know a lot of work, a lot of time and energy went into coming up with this agreement. You know, we always say, let's work together, let's do things in unity and I believe, from my point of view, I believe that's what has been done. Everybody is trying to work together for the good of the city and this is one of the things that I believe that they have done. A lot of work. In listening to what they said and how they explained it to us, I had a greater understanding of what was going on and I appreciate the work that went, all the administration and anyone that was involved, I do appreciate it. Because I have an understanding. Do I wish we had a lot of money, yes I do. Do I pray for it, yes. But as it is, this is where we are now, so instead of criticizing, I think sometimes we should just say thank you for the work you have done. So, for me, I'm saying thank you for the work that both sides did. I do appreciate it. Thank you.

The bill was read and placed upon the floor for final passage, seconded by Mrs. Carmichael. The vote was taken and resulted as follows: Ayes: 7, Nays: 1. Ayes: Carmichael, Haring, Hazen, Hightower, Hill, Jefferson and Rock. Nay: Versaw.

The bill was declared passed, signed by the President, approved by the Mayor and attested by the Clerk.

MR. VERSAW: We were given another proposal last night, what, 15%? What are we voting on here?

PRESIDENT SCOTT: It says not to shut off more than 50%.

MAYOR CULLIVER: I wasn't here last night but I think the program was, this year gave you a program of 15%. The original statement was for 50%. Now we did have some suggestions, (inaudible). What happened is, we will go with the 15% and if we can expand that out through other suggestions, then we can go more. But if we put ourselves in a box, we can't do that, that's why it's up to 50%. (inaudible). Does that make sense? (end of tape).

MRS. HARING: ...or tell people to report it and to whom?

SSD MESSER: Use the website or if you have a specific address just let the Mayor's office know.

MRS. HARING: So they should call the Mayor's office if they have a street light out.

MAYOR CULLIVER: No, they should go to the website first.

MRS. HARING: The First Energy website first.

MAYOR CULLIVER: Yes.

MRS. HARING: Now, I wouldn't have known to do that. How does everybody know to do that, to turn those street lights on?

MAYOR CULLIVER: When they call up.

MRS. HARING: And you'll give them that information.

MAYOR CULLIVER: No. What happens, if they call my office, I need to call him and he calls directly to (?). (Inaudible).

MRS. HARING: I think this is really important because last night after he said that, I don't look at street lights cuz I'm driving, which is probably a good thing, but on the way home between Main St. and I think it was the Renaissance Theatre I counted 3 or 4 that were out. So, by what process, how is that going, reporting outages and street lights? Is that just something that the citizenry does?

SSD MESSER: Self reporting.

MRS. HARING: So, would that not be a good idea to have some enhanced vigilance before we start turning lights off to, or is First Energy, somehow, going, how do we get these lights back on before we start turning 50% of them off? Up to 50% off.

SSD MESSER: We have to report this to First Energy, there's a process, The News Journal could do a little thing about how to get a light fixed. Or the 800 number.

MRS. HARING: Also, there is a concern, a perception, that crime increases with lights being dimmed. So I talked to Asst. Chief Smith earlier this evening and I know there's been a lot of work done with neighborhood watch groups, perhaps a lot of people fall through the cracks though, they're not part of the neighborhood watch group discussion, so how can we allay some of that, there is no documentation, that I'm aware of that says crime increases if you turn out street lights, yet people are concerned that that is exactly what happens. So, how can we ease that fear or not?

SSD MESSER: Your conclusion is correct. There's no correlation between street lights and crime but there is between street lights and (?). I encourage people to get involved in neighborhood watches. (Microphone not on). I think the media could do a story on (?). It's a good point to clarify right now, I know the News Journal did have an error cuz they printed what we gave them but I heard from several different watch leaders throughout the day and night. Last week we got with the leaders and gave them all maps and talked to them about the plans and asked them to check their areas because just because we said

we're going to turn off light 1, 2, and 3 that they can check and see that we should not turn those off and 5, 7, and 9 would be better, we would accept their input. The article that was in the paper today said there were 42 pages of 60 lights per page that are going to be turned off (inaudible). Just to clarify, right now we're looking at tuning off 843 lights, 16.5% of the lights but we are still open to suggestions throughout the entire process and especially encouraging those who are in neighborhood watch associations to get with their leaders and look at the updated maps. (inaudible). We do appreciate the input the neighborhood watch is giving. (inaudible).

MRS. HARING: So, if we pass this plan this evening, when do the lights start going out?

SSD MESSER: (Microphone not on). Within the next few weeks.

MRS. HARING: So will correct street addresses be released to the media?

SSD MESSER: When it's finalized. If you would like to come up, the map shows 843 lights to be turned off. What we're trying to say is, that is not written in concrete. We can manipulate that list based on input from residents.

MRS. HARING: Within the next 2 weeks.

SSD MESSER: Within the next 2 weeks. They are meeting next Wednesday to finalize some of (?).

MRS. HARING: When you say this is going to take effect in 2 weeks, how long does it take to turn off 800 lights?

SSD MESSER: We have no idea. It could take until the end of the year.

MRS. HARING: Really? Ok. So, it isn't you pull the plug and they all go off.

MR. HILL: Microphone not on.

MRS. HARING: There are programs called "Adopt a Light" and you can do that.

Several people talking at once, no microphones on.

MR. VERSAW: (Microphone not on).

MRS. HARING: So could you clarify, Mr. Remy or someone.

MAYOR CULLIVER: Let me say 2 things. First of all, I don't know what Doug keeps coming from because he's never (inaudible) and he's questioning our integrity here. You told us to be flexible, you told us to take ideas, so we gave you a piece of legislation so that we can take ideas and we can be flexible and he still wants (inaudible). There's

something wrong about that. I'm sorry. This is a good piece of legislation and we're going to do, you remember when we gave you all those plans in the recovery plan, we told council we were going to do what you asked us to do and that's exactly what we're going to do. This piece of legislation lets you decide what lights you want and lets the neighborhood watch decide, not the administration. This is not an administration plan and we're going to go out there and turn out any lights. It's your program Doug, and if you want to tell us what lights to turn off (inaudible). You don't trust us, that's fine and everybody else, vote your conscience. I haven't lied to you before, we won't lie to you this time either.

MRS. HARING: Is there going to be a way, if someone calls us and said it, what do we refer to in answering the questions about (?).

SSD MESSER:we agreed that we would have to turn off 50% of the lights in order to achieve the designated savings. After the Engineer started calculating figures with the help of Ohio Edison and the others, we determined that because some lights were only \$39 a year, it doesn't make sense to turn them off (inaudible). So they recalculated and determined if you turned off about 15.5% of the most expensive lights, we can achieve 75% of the targeted savings. That's where we are. That's 823 lights. (inaudible). Yes, it does say up to 50%.

MAYOR CULLIVER: Microphone not on.

AFTER LEGISLATION:

MRS. HIGHTOWER: Quickly, I want to say last night, Mr. Mutti and Rev. L., they presented us with a resolution in regard to the beer garden at the fair and my thoughts on it is the fact I did get 3 telephone calls, one citizen asked me what we were going to do. Their thought was on it, that they didn't agree to it and in the paper it did say that it was going to be an experiment. My thoughts is the fact that thinking what is the purpose of the fair, I believe it's a family thing, the children go to the fair, they work all year to present whatever they have, their animals or whatever and I believe that it shouldn't be an experiment to see. I think they should keep it as a family affair, so my thought is, I would like to have a motion to bring it forth to see what our city council thinks.

PRESIDENT SCOTT: I'm sorry Mrs. Hightower, is your motion to...

MRS. HIGHTOWER: A resolution to oppose the decision of the Richland County Agricultural Society Fair Board to introduce a beer garden in the 2011 Richland County Fair on the week of August 7-13.

PRESIDENT SCOTT: So it would be a motion to oppose the sale beer at the county fair.

MR. JEFFERSON: The motion would be (inaudible).

PRESIDENT SCOTT: Right. Although we don't have the formal resolution, I don't know if we want to formally adopt that resolution as it is, I think probably the thing to do would just be to make a resolution to oppose the sale of the beer garden at the fairgrounds. Would that not be correct Law Director?

LAW DIRECTOR REMY: We talked about this before the meeting tonight and I believe that lacking the ability to present to you a written resolution before the fair began, which happens to start this Sunday, council could, in the form of a verbal motion, verbal resolution to oppose the beer garden at the fairgrounds. In simple form, as Mrs. Hightower has read it which is the header to the resolution that was presented to us. A draft of the resolution was given to us last night by Mr. Mutti and that header is what Mrs. Hightower read, a resolution in opposition to the beer garden at the county fair this year.

PRESIDENT SCOTT: Do we have a second to the motion? (Mrs. Carmichael seconded the motion).

MR. VERSAW: Didn't we sign the back of that sheet? Yes. Why don't, we the undersigned, City Council of Mansfield, Ohio, oppose this and we can all sign that tonight. Whoever wants to go over and sign that sheet right there, you can deliver it to the fair board. Just take your resolution and we can all sign it and you can take it out. I'll sign it.

PRESIDENT SCOTT: I think it's more of a statement. I don't think it's probably going to change anything, unfortunately Ben, but I think it's more of us making a statement.

MR. JEFFERSON: I want to be on public record that I don't support it. I'm just, I can't get into telling the County fair board how to run their fair. We don't want, at least I don't want, the county fair board up here telling us how to do city council in any way. If they want to get a beer garden, that's their right. They're running the fair. They have the right to make revenue, to try to generate some revenue. I don't think we should, not we, I don't want to be sticking my nose in what they do out there at the fair and I'm a little perplexed about citizens coming up here asking us to do things like this, particularly with a religious overtone. This is government and we should stay separate from religion. My personal opinion here is this. Those things should be taught in the church and at home, not out in the public. I'm preachin'? Yes I'm preachin', I'm going to give my opinion. You're a preacher, maybe you should preach in the church to not drink beer. Don't bring it out in the public and try to have government enforce this on people and that's just my opinion, so I want to go on public record that I'm not in support of trying to tell people how to run their functions.

MRS. CARMICHAEL: I don't think we're trying to tell them what to do, we're just giving them our opinion. I don't think it should be around the children when they're out having fun and also, I think they're bringing a real hardship on theirselves because somebody gets drunk on a ride, that's a big liability to the fairgrounds.

MR. JEFFERSON: I think these men are...

MR. VERSAW: This is a non-binding resolution. It doesn't tell them they can't, it's just our opinions that we're not in favor of it, but they can still do whatever they want. We're not forcing them one way or the other.

MR. JEFFERSON: I know that! You can put your name in the paper, I'm not signing anything.

MR. HAZEN: I'd write the resolution and I completely agree with the concept of the resolution as far as what's stated here as far as traffic fatalities, binge drinking, but I have to agree completely with Mr. Jefferson. We have beer gardens at Rock-n-Ribs, we have beer gardens at Miss Ohio, we have beer gardens at a lot of different functions. If the fair board wants to experiment with it, then so be it, try the experiment and I think what they'll find is probably what exactly Mrs. Carmichael states which is that you're going to end up with a few more issues than they thought they were going to end up with, but I'm a libertarian on this one and I think if they want to try it they should be able to try it. If this was a dry county, it would be a different issue. I'm in agreement with Mr. Jefferson on this one.

LAW DIRECTOR REMY: I would make one suggestion and that is if you make your motion in an oral format and that you not sign the resolution that's been presented, my opinion, professional or otherwise, it has too much verbiage in it and it's not to the point. I don't think it would be wise for council to sign that. If you want to vote on it verbally, it would be recorded as making a non-binding verbal resolution to oppose it, that's fine.

PRESIDENT SCOTT: Council will cast their vote electronically on the motion.
Motion passes 5-3
